Preparing our children for the Feast of All Saints and All Souls.


November 1st and 2nd are two very important feasts in the life of the Church: the Feast of All Saints and the Feast of All Souls. In these feasts the Church celebrates all those who have died and are now

with God. We go to Mass to remember all these holy people and to pray for those preparing to join them in heaven with our Father.

When speaking with your children about the Saints, you want to remind them that everyone who has lived and died believing in the love of Jesu is a saint. Some of these people are very well known, like St. Peter, St. Francis or St. Therese of Lisieux. Others, may be people only known to us, such as

members of our family, friends, or neighbours. Some of these people lived their lives so much like Jesus that the Church says that they are definitely in heaven and calls them Saints.

Help your children know that we are



All saints in the making—this is what we understand as the call to holiness. Saints are people who love God and share his love with others.

Finally, help your children know that the saints and those who have died are never far away from us. We can talk to them through prayer – it's like having a friend who lives close to Jesus. 3. Some things to think about before we read the Gospel.

Today we are talking about **LOVE.**

I'm sure we can all say we love our parents, our family, and our friends. And that's awesome, because in today's gospel Jesus is teaching us that Love is so very important.

So here is a really tough question for you: **How**

would you describe love?

Love is a bit hard to describe! It cannot be seen or held in our hands; it has no colour or shape; it cannot be described by size or what it looks like. Love is a very special feeling



Here's another question:

Who loves you, and who do
you love?

Can you list three or four?

Well guess what? As much as you love them, God loves them even more!

How does being loved make

you feel? Pretty awesome!

To feel that we are loved by someone fills us with happiness and security; it is a feeling that everybody

How do people show that they love one another?

It is something we can show or express by our words and our actions. For instance through a simple handshake, a kiss or giving someone a hug. Also we can tell someone we love them or simply just treat them with kindness.

God gave Moses ten commandments to help his people to lead lives pleasing to God. What are the two commaments that Jesus said are the most important? Why do you think that Jesus chose these two above all the others?

By loving God all that we can, each of us learns to become more loving and ready to share that love with each other. And remember, "our neighbour" isn't just the people who live next door to us, or even people we know well. They include both people we know well and those that we might meet by chance. Everyone is our neighbour.

Jesus showed us how to love by caring for and healing the sick, the blind and the paralyzed. He made time for people and was ready to listen and share with them. He was forgiving. He taught us to not judge others but to give them another chance when they make mistakes. More importantly, there's no greater act of love than Jesus giving His life for us. He showed us the depth of His love when he died on the cross.



Praying together to Our Father


Let's now pray together a very special prayer that Jesus taught us,
