Reflection for the First Day:

Isaac Jogues came to Canada only seven months after his priestly ordination. He helped to build Ste. Marie among the Hurons. He was captured by the Iroquois on a trip from Quebec City to Ste. Marie, and was tortured and made a slave for thirteen months. Through all of this, he maintained his trust in the Lord; he eventually escaped to France with the help of some Dutch merchants. He came back to Canada and volunteered to serve as a messenger to the Iroquois, knowing the danger but trusting in God's care. He was captured and killed on October 18, 1646.

St. Charles Garnier

God is Gentle and Wants to Heal Me

Scripture:

Then Jesus said, "There was a man who had two sons. The younger of them said to his father, 'Father, give me the share of the property that will belong to me. So he divided his property between them. A few days later the younger son gathered all he had and traveled to a distant country, and there he squandered his property in dissolute living. When he had spent everything, a severe famine took place throughout the country, and he began to be in need. So he went and hired himself out to one of the citizens of that country, who sent him to his fields to feed the pigs. He would gladly have filled himself with the pods that the pigs were eating; and no one gave him anything. But when he came to himself he said, 'How many of my father's hired hands have bread enough to spare, but here I am dying of hunger! I will get up and go to my father, and I will say to him, "Father, I have sinned against heaven and before you; I am no longer worthy to be called your son; treat me like one of your hired hands."' So he set off and went to his father. But while he was still far off, his father saw him and was filled with compassion; he ran and put his arms around him and kissed him. Then the son said to him, 'Father, I have sinned against heaven and before you; I am no longer worthy to be called your son.' But the father said to his slaves, 'Quickly, bring out a robe—the best one—and put it on him; put a ring on his finger and sandals on his feet. And get the fatted calf and kill it, and let us eat and celebrate; for this son of mine was dead and is alive again; he was lost and is found!' And they began to celebrate.

Now the elder son was in the field: and when he came and approached the house, he heard music and dancing. He called one of the slaves and asked what was going on. He replied, 'Your brother has come and your father has killed the fatted calf, because he has got him back safe and sound.' Then he became angry and refused to go in. His father came out and began to plead with him. But he answered his father, 'Listen! For all these years I have been working like a slave for you, and I have never disobeyed your command; yet you have never given me even a young goat so that I might celebrate with my friends. But when this son of yours came back, who has devoured your property with prostitutes, you killed the fatted calf for him!' Then the father said to him, 'Son, you are always with me, and all that is mine is yours. But we had to celebrate and rejoice because this brother of yours was dead and has come to life; he was lost and has been found.

Reflection for the Second Day:

Charles Garnier came to Huronia at the age of thirty-one, and served the Native People for thirteen years. On December 7, 1649, he was killed, along with the people he served, by an Iroquois raiding party. Though severely wounded, his only concern was the care of those who had been hurt among his friends. He was gentle, innocent and fearless; it is said that people were won to the faith just by looking at his face, which shone with God's desire to heal the broken with gentle love.

St. Noel Chabanel

God leads me to Greater Freedom

Scripture:

For we know that the law is spiritual; but I am of the flesh, sold into slavery under sin. I do not understand my own actions. For I do not do what I want, but I do the very thing I hate. Reflection for the Third Day:

Noel Chabanel had been one of the most successful teachers the Jesuits had in France. There was no language he could not learn. He wanted very much to come and serve as a missionary in North America. When he arrived, however, he found that he could not learn any of the Native languages, and that he could not find any work that he was any good at. In great despair, he began to experience a deep desire to give up and return to France. He knew that in some way, God had called him to Huronia, and that the desire to return to France was a temptation. He found however, that he was powerless to prevent the temptation. After much prayer, he made a special vow to God to remain always in Huronia, to be faithful to God's call. The temptations ceased.

St. Anthony Daniel

God Calls me to Conversion of Heart

Scripture:

Once more Jesus spoke to them in parables, saying: "The kingdom of heaven may be compared to a king who gave a wedding banquet for his son. He sent his slaves to call those who had been invited to the wedding banquet, but they would not come. Again he sent other slaves, saying, 'Tell those who have been invited: Look, I have prepared my dinner, my oxen and my fat calves have been slaughtered, and everything is ready: come to the wedding banquet.' But they made light of it and went away, one to his farm, another to his business, while the rest seized his slaves, mistreated them, and killed them. The king was enraged. He sent his troops, destroyed those murderers and burned their city. Then he said to his slaves, 'The wedding is ready, but those invited were not worthy. God and invite everyone you find to the wedding banquet.' Those slaves went out into the streets and gathered all whom they found, both good and bad; so the wedding hall was filled with guests.

"But when the king came in to see the guests, he noticed a man there who was not wearing a wedding robe and he said to him, 'Friend, how did you get in here without a wedding robe?' And he was speechless. Then the king said to the attendants, 'Bind him hand and foot, and throw him into the outer darkness, where there will be weeping and gnashing of teeth. Reflection for the Fifth Day:

Anthony Daniel came to Canada soon after his priestly ordination, and immediately went to work on the missions. He learned the language of the Native People he served very quickly. Brébeuf wrote of him, "I never saw one more resolute to start out for Huronia even when he was told he might lose his life on the way." St. Anthony had the kind of holy zeal that comes from a life lived honestly and in God's freedom. He died when he tried to delay the Iroquois attack on his Church by standing in front of its entrance, thus giving the people of his village time to escape.

Scripture:

Now before the festival of the Passover, Jesus knew that his hour had come to depart from this world and go to the Father. Having loved his own who were in the world, he loved them to the end. The devil had already put it into the heart of Judas son of Simon Iscariot to betray him. And during supper Jesus, knowing that the Father had given all things into his hands, and that he had come from God and was going to God, got up from the table, took off his outer robe, and tied a towel around himself. Then he poured water into a basin and began to wash the disciples' feet and to wipe them with the towel that was tied around him. He came to Simon Peter, who said to him, "Lord, are you going to wash my feet?" Jesus answered, "You do not know now what I am doing, but later you will understand." Reflection for the Sixth Day:

René Goupil was trained in medicine, and offered his services to the Jesuit Missions in Canada. He arrived in Canada in 1640 and served French colonists and native converts in whom he saw Jesus' suffering and whom he treated with patience and charity. He was captured with Isaac Jogues in 1642 and was taken to the Mohawk country. He lived with St. Isaac among the people there, caring for them and healing them as he had always done. He was martyred for making the sign of the cross, the sign of God's healing love on a little child.

"Compassionate God, grant me an ever-deepening awareness of the freedom you give me in Christ Jesus."

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Day Seven:

St. Jean de Brébeuf

Jesus Invites us to join him in Freeing Others

Hymn: Holy God We Praise Your Name (CBW631)

Greeting:

Priest: In the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit.

Scripture:

Once while Jesus was standing beside the lake of Gennesaret, and the crowd was pressing in on him to hear the word of God, he saw two boats there at the shore of the lake; the fishermen had gone out of them and were washing their nets. He got into one of the boats, the one belonging to Simon, and asked him to put out a little way from the shore. Then he sat down and taught the crowds from the boat. When he had finished speaking, he said to Simon, "Put out into the deep water and let down your nets for a catch." Simon answered, "Master, we have worked all night long but have caught nothing. Yet if you say so, I will let down the nets." When they had done this, they caught so many fish that their nets were beginning to break. So they signalled their partners in the other boat to come and help them. And they came and filled both boats, so that they began to sink. But when Simon Peter saw it, he fell down at Jesus' knees, saying, "Go away from me, Lord, for I am a sinful man!" For he and all who were with him were amazed at the catch of fish that they had taken; and so also were James and John, sons of Zebedee, who were partners with Simon. Then Jesus said to Simon, "Do not be afraid; from now on you will be catching people." When they had brought their boats to shore, they left everything and followed him. ~ Luke 5:1-11

Reflection for the Seventh Day:

Jean de Brébeuf was the first Jesuit missionary to Huronia. He worked there for thirteen years, bringing the Good News to many people and helping to kindle the fire of God's love in their hearts. He knew how much Jesus had done for him, and his deepest desire was to be of service with Christ, to share in work, love, suffering and resurrection of Jesus, to be made "a man according to Jesus' heart." He made a vow never to refuse the offer of Martyrdom if asked to die for Christ. He was captured on March 16, 1649, tortured and killed.

Ask for the Grace:

"Jesus, let me not be deaf to your call, but alert to respond to you and join you in bringing your freedom to others."

Reflection for the Eighth Day:

Gabriel Lalemant entered the Jesuit at a young age. He was of frail health and not very physically strong, but his deepest wish was to serve on the Canadian Missions. His superiors, anxious that he might not survive the harsh conditions, did not at first allow him to come to Canada. After many repeated requests, however, he arrived here in 1648, where in the words of Scripture, he was destined to complete a long time in a short space. He had been here only seven months when he was captured with Brébeuf. They were tortured together, but this frail and feeble man outlived St. Jean de Brébeuf by many hours.

"Without your grace, O God, I cannot follow Jesus along the way: Purify my heart and my mind that I may seek to serve and praise you in all things."
